

1.808 MHz (160m) – 3.528 MHz (80m) – 7.028 MHz (40m) – 10.118 MHz (30m) – 14.058 MHz (20m) – 18.085 MHz (17m) – 21.058 MHz (15m) – 24.908 MHz (12m) – 28.058 MHz (10m)

Members are reminded that the above frequencies are suggested calling frequencies. If they are busy, it is suggested that once you establish contact with a station, it may be prudent to change frequency down the band, avoiding other calling frequencies of known clubs.

So there you have it – and just remember – a cluttered shack is the sign of an active ham!


"THE LONG SILENCE FALLS" By ZL2AOH-Ralph #1073

I received a package from RSGB, just after my 90th birthday. I was delighted to find that it contained a copy of this handsome book that was a present from my good friend **G3KMG-David #124**. Although I was never a radio officer, as a deck officer, I had served with and become friendly with many ROs, and of course, many of our FISTS members were members of that noble profession. It is a production of the Radio Officers' Association (ROA), although, strangely, it does not have the usual publisher's identification. It is obtainable on-line from the RSGB bookshop: - http://www.rsgbshop.org/acatalog/Online Catalogue General Books 30.html-

The formal opening is an introduction by Prof Brian Cotton, Life President of ROA, and a foreword by Capt Richard Woodman, Elder Brother, Trinity House and a brief editor's note. The main content of the book is of articles that have appeared on the ROA's own quarterly newsletter, "QSO". It covers all aspects of how radio officers were trained, appointed to ships, and their shipboard life and shore-going escapades. Much reference to beer and baccy, and as most were adolescents, girls! As can be expected in a book on the era of ROs there are tales of wartime and other operational successes and failures. Discussed are various types of equipment, the part the Marconi Company played, appointments to specialised ships, shore stations and even radio operations from aircraft. New Zealand and Australia receive attention. There are two articles by our members. **ZL2WT-David #9067** contributed an article about his experiences in a deep-sea trawler together with pictures (including one of himself.) There is one by


ZL2GKB-lain #12 that includes a quotation from our editor **ZL2TX-Nigel #9040**. There are illustrations of ships and ROs and an interesting supplement on the early uses of distress calls.

The contributors are not professional writers, however, the articles are informative, entertaining and an enjoyable read. It's a very heavy handsome hard covered volume 225 x 288 x 16 mm; the illustrated covers are reproduced here.



I learned many things that I didn't know before. For instance, some ROs reported that that, as radio silence was maintained, they were tasked with undertaking the visual signalling from the bridge in convoy. That never happened in any ship in which I served; we deck officers were the signallers. (That's how I honed my Morse capability, on the Aldis lamp.) In addition, I was surprised to hear how many ROs there were on the big passenger ships where a strong pecking order prevailed. The junior ROs there mainly handled passenger traffic and news and were lumbered with the unpopular watches.

I feel sure our members, especially former ROs, will enjoy this book. Thanks David, it is a great gift.
